SCEC Completes 2010 Annual Campaign

SCEC wrapped up its 2010 annual fundraising campaign, *Energizing Washington County*, December 31 with \$93,834 in contributions, including a \$20,000 challenge grant from the C.F. Adams Charitable Trust. This total exceeded SCEC's goal of \$75,000 by almost \$19,000.

"On behalf of our Board of Directors and staff, I'd like to thank everyone involved for making this year's campaign a success," SCEC Board Chairman Josh Bragg said. "It's a difficult economy to raise

money, but we have many faithful contributors and a dedicated committee of Board members who went above and beyond to get the word out about how local dollars are

initiating and facilitating the creation of jobs and prosperity in Washington County."

Ed Hennessey kicked off the campaign with Machias Savings Bank's \$15,000 contribution in September.

In order to receive the Adams challenge grant, SCEC had to raise at least \$20,000 in new or increased donations from 2009. Clossey reported that the organization concluded 2010 with \$39,672 in that category.

SCEC 2010 Annual Meeting Held in Milbridge

SCEC held its 2010 Annual Meeting at The Pines in Milbridge on October 20th. The evening featured remarks highlighting positive economic activities underway in Washington County from SCEC Executive Director Harold Clossey, a presentation from John Ferland of Ocean Renewable Power Company (ORPC) (see page 2), and a brief ceremony honoring departing Board members.

SCEC paid tribute to departing Board members Tony McKim (The First), Edwin Plissey of Machiasport, and Roland "Skip" Rogers (Federal Marine Terminals) for their service to the organization. New Board members Susan Corbett (Axiom Technologies), Dr. Phil Grant (ret. Husson University), Blaine Jones (Bangor Savings Bank) and Sheridan Smith (Border

Electric) were introduced to the public, as was incoming Board chair Josh Bragg (CES, Inc.), vice chair Leola Carter (Bayside & 4 Corners Shop 'n' Saves), treasurer Shirley Erickson (Maine Educational Loan Authority) and secretary Chris Lyford (Machias Savings Bank).

SCEC presented its 2010 Partner of the Year Award to Washington County Manager Betsy Fitzgerald for her efforts

on economic and community development work and her collaborative spirit. Fitzgerald joined County government in February, and has been involved in the county's Tax Increment Fi-

ancing (TIF) program for the Unorganized Territories, which SCEC administers, as well as efforts to encourage further business investment in the region.

"I'm shocked and awed – but not speechless," quipped Fitzgerald. "Thank you very much. I don't do this alone. I do it with a lot of people, and 90% of you are sitting in this room. Thank you all."

ORPC Tidal Energy Presentation Highlights SCEC 2010 Annual Meeting



John Ferland, Director of Projects, Ocean Renewable Power Company (ORPC), discusses tidal energy development in Washington County. "Eastport, Maine is the Kitty Hawk of tidal energy. The whole world is watching," Ferland explained.

"It [tidal energy] is having an economic impact now. This project has put to work over 80 people in 16 counties. There's a cluster of activity in Washington County, and this is going to grow as the company matures, as the project grows and as more service companies, supply firms, and so on, get involved in the industry. That base is being set," John Ferland, ORPC Director of Operations, said. "Over \$5 million has been spent in this state over the last couple of years,

most of that in the past 18 months. Spending in the Eastport area has been about \$2 million over that same time frame. There's going to be more spending locally. How it shows up is in jobs, contractors, direct employees of ORPC. It's spending in the communities, fuel, supplies. The bulk of this is going to happen in the Eastport area, but it's also going to happen in the Lubec area." For more information visit: www.oceanrenewablepower.com

Administered by SCEC for Washington County Government, the TIF fund has distributed over \$200,000 to businesses and nonprofits in the County's Unorganized Territories. The UT TIF, created by the Stetson I

SCEC Joins Regional Sustainable Communities Planning Grant Consortium

SCEC is part of a unique collaboration between Aroostook and Washington counties that will align community development plans such as comprehensive, economic development, emergency management, transportation, and workforce devel-

opment plans to find efficiencies, fill gaps, and build connections on a regional basis.

A wide ranging consortium, major participants include: Aroostook Washington Local Workforce Investment Board (LWIB), Northern Maine
